Preparing for Year 12 : (Subject) Politics

We want you to begin your Year 12 Studies feeling prepared and confident. Therefore, you will be tasked with completing a range of Summer Work for the subjects you plan to continue studying. If you are unsure which subjects you might want to study, you should complete work for the subjects you are considering. This will help give you a “taster” of the subject, in place of the taster lessons you would normally be receiving face-to-face. **You should expect to spend a minimum of 15 hours on each subject.** All work should be submitted to your teacher in September, however not all will require feedback.

Task B- Political Parties, you must answer the following for **FOUR UK** political parties of your choice.

1. Name and symbol of Political Party
2. Leader of Party
3. Four key policies from the 2019 General Election.
4. Share of the vote/Number of seats won in 2019.

Repeat all 4 points for the elections of 1979 and 1997.

Task C- Find out the **composition of Parliament (The Houses of Commons)** and then write a short paragraph as to whether you think Parliament is **representative** or not backing your answer up with evidence.

1. How many MPs in total?
2. How many from each party?
3. How many men/women?
4. How many from ethnic backgrounds?
5. What’s the age range and average age?
6. What about educational background?
7. Previous employment background?
8. **How has this changed over the last 2**
